

A New Law School Building

The Dean's Corner

As we approach Law Day, 1984, I want to extend an invitation to you to attend our festivities. Our annual Law Day dinner will be held at the Ramada Inn in Columbia on Friday evening, April 27. Many class reunions will also be held that evening, and you will be hearing from your class chairman soon if you have not already done so. Saturday morning we'll have our usual awards ceremonies, and



will wind up with our luncheon on the lawn at noon. I hope you can attend and enjoy seeing the faculty and your former classmates.

A highlight of Law Day this year will be the kickoff of the Building Program, our campaign to raise funds for the new law building. Many people have been working hard for a number of months in organizing this campaign and recruiting volunteers. The response has been extremely gratifying. I honestly believe that there is no law school in this country with the degree of alumni loyalty and support enjoyed by UMC.

Bob Hawkins of Jefferson City is serving as general chairman of the Building Program, which is under the general sponsorship of the Law School Foundation. Elsewhere in this issue of the Transcript you'll find profiles of Bob and the five vice-chairmen who are working with him to make this effort a success. If you can attend the Law Day dinner, you'll have an opportunity to see a slide show that will show the new building design in detail and will illustrate the great opportunity we have to give the school the kind of facility it needs.

Even though our campaign is not yet officially under way, a number of alumni have already volunteered their generous financial support. We'll have a complete report on these activities at Law Day. However, it is already clear that the Building Program is going to be highly successful, thanks to you and your fellow graduates of the law school.

We've been having a number of impressive speakers at the Law School these days. Each of the Missouri gubernatorial candidates has been invited to address our student body during the spring. In February we heard from Eleanor Holmes Norton, former chair of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. In March Judge Lee Loevinger, former FCC commissioner and assistant attorney general in the Antitrust Division, spoke to students and faculty as the Earl F. Nelson lecturer. In April, Prof. Tom Lambert delivered the annual Jack Adler Foundation Lecture. Our commencement speaker, on May 18 this year, will be Rex E. Lee, solicitor general of the United States.

Last October a reinspection team representing the American Bar Association Section of Legal Education and Admission to the Bar visited the law school. This visit was part of the regular process followed by the ABA every seven years. We have now received the team's report. In general, it is very complimentary and recognizes the school's many strengths. In its summary, the report states:

". . . UMC law school avows an aspiration to maintain, if not improve, its current ranking in the top third of ABA-accredited law schools. This aspiration can be sustained and even surpassed if the school acquires the projected new building and if general funds are increased enough to bring them in line with those of competitive schools."

After considering this report, the Accreditation Committee informed the University on February 20, 1984 that it believes there is a problem with the low levels of the law school's faculty salaries, and is "deeply concerned" with the inadequate physical facilities in which the school operates. We must submit a further report by October 1, 1984, indicating the progress made toward getting an acceptable building.

As you can see, the campaign to raise funds for the new law building is crucial to the school's future. So also is the willingness of the General Assembly to appropriate funds for the building's construction. The political observers tell us that there is no serious chance that a capital bond issue for University buildings will come out of the 1984 legislative session, so we are expecting to concentrate our efforts on the 1985 session. Please do all you can to remind our friends in the General Assembly that it must do its part to insure our continuing quality.

See you at law day.

Dugan, a senior campaign consultant from the Chicago firm of John Grenzebach and Associates has been working full time on the campaign organization since October, 1983 and will continue to do so until the program is completed. Ed has a long and successful background in campaign direction with over \$250 million in prior campaigns. He has established an office in Room 228 of Tate Hall (telephone 314/882-8274) and would welcome any information that you feel might be helpful to the building program.

Current plans are to continue to develop a campaign organization that will eventually cover the entire body of law school alumni and alumnae within the State of Missouri and elsewhere around the country. The first official announcement of the Building Program and the results of early solicitations will be announced on Law Day. Following that announcement all of our alumni will be brought up to date through a campaign newsletter expected to be mailed during the nonth of June.

Limbaugh Appointed to Bench

Stephen N. Limbaugh, Sr. ('51) was sworn in on July 21, 1983, as a United States district court judge for the Eastern District of Missouri. Judge Limbaugh is a native of Cape Girardeau who graduated from Southeast Missouri State before attending UMC. After law school, Limbaugh joined the law firm of Limbaugh, Limbaugh, Russell and Syler in Cape Girardeau where he remained until his appointment to the bench by President Reagan. He served as Cape Girardeau prosecuting attorney from 1955-58 and as city attorney from 1964-68.

Judge Limbaugh recently served as president of the Missouri Bar and has served on the Board of Governors for the past seven years. He has written many articles for the *Journal of the Missouri Bar*. He is a member of the Cape Girardeau County Bar Association, the Bar Association of Metropolitan St. Louis, the American Judicature Society and a Fellow in the American College of Probate Counsel. In 1982 Judge Limbaugh received the Law Alumni Association Citation of Merit from UMC. Limbaugh is married and has three sons.

MATA Sponsors Voir Dire Presentation



On February 21, 1984 the Missouri Association of Trial Attorneys sponsored a presentation on voir dire in a medical malpractice case. The featured speaker was George Tyree of the Blue Springs, Missouri firm of Cochran, Tyree, Oswald, Barton and McDonald, P.C. Tyree began his presentation with the same low key, soft-spoken introduction he might use when introducing himself to the prospective jurors on a real case. As he explained, the important thing is to develop a rapport with the jury and make them feel at

ease. As a rule of thumb, Tyree said that "to do voir dire is to give your opening statement."

Tyree summed up his philosophy of voir dire in two words, identity and primacy. He explained that identity was important because you are trying to have the jurors identify with your client. Since what a jury thinks of your client is often based on their initial impression, it is important to have the jury identify with your client early. The best time to work on identity is on voir dire. Primacy is related to identity in that what is heard first is most remembered and best believed. Thus an attorney doing voir dire should make his case early.

Tyree stressed that in doing voir dire you should also pay attention to mechanics: arrive early, get the best seat, check out the courtroom in advance, diagram the jury box, get jury questionnaires as soon as possible. With that advance preparation an attorney can more easily assess the individual jurors and how they might feel about his client's cause. When the questioning of the panel begins, Tyree said that general questions should be asked in order to draw out the jurors. What's important is to find out what they are thinking and then help the jury develop a feeling of peer group approval.

The attorney should show the jury the heart of his case, present any problems briefly and try to limit the issues so his burden is no bigger than necessary. Using simple words, the attorney should try to present his case, witnesses and evidence using the words of the MAI's that the jurors will later take back to the jury room.

Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals Hears Oral Arguments in Tate Hall

The United States Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit heard oral arguments in three cases in the Tate Hall Courtroom on January 26, 1984. Sitting were Judges Floyd R. Gibson ('33), John R. Gibson ('52) and Theodore McMillan.

The first case to be heard was American Family Life Assurance Co. v. Joseph P. Teasdale. While Governor, Teasdale ordered the State Department of Insurance to ban the sale of cancer insurance, calling such insurance a "rip-off." The insurance company sued Teasdale, claiming his action had deprived it of due process, interfered with its contracts and damaged its reputation. After the jury found for Teasdale, the trial court awarded Teasdale attorneys' fees on the ground that the suit was filed for revenge. In the appeal, the insurance company sought to show errors in the conduct of the trial and to reverse the award of attorneys' fees.

The second case heard was United States v. Lewis. Lewis was convicted of mail fraud for making fraudulent credit card applications and then using those cards to order merchandise. The police, without a warrant, opened a mail box which they believed Lewis was using to receive the merchandise ordered. On appeal, Lewis attacked the validity of the mailbox search and the admissibility of the evidence derived from it. He also asserted that his trial was unfair because of the adverse publicity he received in connection with the Tylenol killings investigation.

The last case, United States v. Thompson involved a conviction on passing counterfeit bills. Thompson's appeal asserted that black jurors were improperly struck from the panel, that there was no competent testimony that the bills were counterfeit and that evidence of other crimes was improperly admitted.

Throughout the morning, the courtroom was crowded. There was an especially good turn out of first year students who were interested in previewing an appellate argument before their turn comes this semester in Moot Court. UMC is especially proud and thankful to have the court sit here. It is a valuable learning experience for our students and an interesting and entertaining event for our faculty and staff.



Laughrey Joins Faculty

We are pleased to announce that Nanette Laughrey joined the UMC School of Law faculty with the fall 1983 semester. Laughrey, a California native, received a degree in theatre arts from UCLA and then moved to New York to work as a writer for Women's Wear Daily. After a stint in New York she became a VISTA volunteer, serving in Des Moines. It was also during this time that she met her husband, Chris Kelly, who now serves as Columbia's state representative from the 26th District.

Laughrey does not consider herself an activist although she does believe that persons with professional backgrounds can and should work to improve their communities. It was this attitude which led her to law school.

It was really a happy accident which led her to law school here at UMC. She and Chris were driving east to Washington, D.C. when they were stopped in Columbia by a sleet storm. Laughrey was already looking at law schools and knew of the school in Columbia. They took advantage of the forced stop to relax, look in at the school, and clean up a little. While doing laundry, Laughrey found the perfect rental property and their minds were made up.

Laughrey, who was first in her class and Coif, received her J.D. in 1975. She served with the Missouri attorney general's office for two years, working with criminal appeals and anti-trust violations. From 1979-83, she served as the municipal judge for the city of Columbia, an experience she finds very beneficial to teaching. It was also at this time that she taught at UMC as an adjunct professor and worked with Craig Van Matre ('70) in Columbia.

Laughrey taught family law the fall semester of 1983 and this spring is teaching estates and trusts and trial practice for the first time. She is particularly excited by teaching trial practice, a course she feels really drives home fundamental skills in analysis, procedure and evidence. Laughrey feels that you can't lose with a law degree since it provides such good training in problem solving.

When asked if she misses California, she says only the weather. She and her husband enjoy Columbia, finding it a very comfortable, healthy area in which to live and rear their two children. Laughrey is looking forward to teaching, helping future UMC law students develop their own analytical skills.

Placement Office Up-Date

The Placement Office has successfully completed another Fall Interview Program with a record 89 legal employers interviewing on the UMC campus at Lowry Hall from mid-September to late November. Seventy of the 89 were private law firms and 11 of the total were from out of state.

Past interviewers were quite pleased this year when introduced to the new facility at Lowry Hall. The newest Law School extension offers newly remodeled interview rooms—all within close proximity to the main Placement Office. Located on the third floor, five separate rooms are available for on-campus recruiters and additional rooms may be used if more space is needed.

Two major corporations were among the new recruiters this year—MAY COMPANY, St. Louis, (owner of Famous-Barr, Venture) and PACIFIC TELEPHONE of San Francisco. (Each company interviewed on campus for associate positions with their general counsel's office.)

Corporate legal employment opportunities for new law school graduates continue on an upward trend throughout the nation. The Placement Office is pleased with the increase of corporate recruiters and has recently added RALSTON-PURINA CO. to the roster of on-campus interviewers for the 1984-85 season.

Interviewing for Women

On November 17, 1983, the Women's Law Caucus sponsored a panel discussion on Interviewing for Women. Panelists were James Butcher ('57), Ann Covington ('77) and Jean Goldstein ('81), adjunct professor of legal research and writing, all of the Columbia firm of Butcher Cline Mallory & Covington. The discussion focused on the typical interview questions concerning a woman's personal plans for career, children and marriage. The consensus of the panelists was that law firms ask questions concerning women's relationships and child-bearing plans because the firm views hiring a new associate as an investment. Because the firm trains the new associate while she builds her own practice the firm has a legitimate concern in its return on investment. Because of this concern the firm is interested in anything which may affect an associate's ability to put in the long hours usually expected. The panelists did agree that these personal questions should be asked of prospective male employees also while Butcher felt that women should not be so sensitive when faced with these legitimate questions.

The audience did not agree with the often expressed feeling that having children and bearing the responsibility for child-rearing is a disability in the practice of law. The attitude that children are a disability seems related to cultural values which view child-rearing as exclusively the female's responsibility. The panel's view was that as sex roles continue to change with males bearing more equal responsibility for child care, having children will not be seen as a disability. For the present time, one suggestion made was for the woman being interviewed to ask how the firm will react when the woman has to meet a family obligation. Both panelists and audience agreed that professionalism on both parts would help since both the firm and the woman have legitimate concerns. However, Butcher also suggested that if a woman did plan to have children after becoming employed she should not volunteer that information to the prospective employer. If the woman has been a satisfactory associate the firm will welcome her back after her pregnancy.

The major conclusion drawn from the discussion was that it is difficult to get to know someone from an interview. Frequently, women are asked personal questions merely to test their reactions. Firms are trying to determine a candidate's personality and ability to field distasteful questions to decide whether to make the investment of hiring a new associate. The best advice the panel offered was for the woman to be cool and professional and realize why they are often asked the distasteful personal questions.

Carnahan Speaks at UMC


On March 1, 1984 Democratic gubernatorial candidate Mel Carnahan ('58) spoke at the law school. Carnahan noted that the past 20 years have been hard on Missouri's image as a leader in the Midwest. Previously, Missouri set the standard for judging state services, now Missouri trails in virtually every category. Carnahan laid the responsibility for this decline on the inactivity and the lack of leadership of the governor. He declared that the Bond-Rothman administration has failed to be candid with the people about the state's problems.

Carnahan said Missourians were not extravagant but did expect good schools, safe homes, reasonable utility rates and fair taxation. Missourians expect to face their problems, be accountable, do what can be done to cure problems and make the best use of the dollars available. The excuse of no money has been too easy.



Carnahan said he would be a governor who would be a chief executive, the person who makes the decisions, who takes some initiative. He wants to lead the state out of its problems, return it to fiscal fitness. He noted that many states have problems similar to Missouri's but that other states had made progress. The difference is a governor who grasps the problem, takes the initiative and proposes solutions. Carnahan pointed to his service as state treasurer as indicating that he possessed that leadership quality.

He concluded that to restore the state to the quality of life which it expects will take money, much effort and very likely, a tax increase. However, taxes cannot be increased in a vacuum. You can't talk about increases without a discussion of needs. People in the state do not realize the level to which state education has sunk. Without that realization, you simply cannot build the type of commitment necessary to restore the quality of life which Missourians expect.



UMC Contributions to the State

The UMC School of Law began in 1872, making it one of the oldest schools west of the Mississippi. There are currently 3,398 living alumni, some 2604 (77 percent) of which are located in Missouri. There is a UMC graduate in every county of Missouri, something no other law school can claim. The additional 794 of our alumni are located out of Missouri in 47 of the 50 states and a few foreign countries.

While UMC graduates make up only about 21 percent of the lawyers in Missouri, our alumni have a disproportionate impact on the legal and political professions in Missouri. Three of the seven Missouri supreme court justices are UMC graduates while ten out of the 32 judges on the Missouri Court of Appeals (all districts) are UMC graduates. UMC graduates hold 52 of the 132 circuit court bench

positions and 60 of the 169 associate circuit court positions. We also have two UMC graduates on the United States Court of Appeals, 8th Circuit and 11 graduates on the United States District Court (Eastern and Western District of Missouri).

One of our graduates, Mel Carnahan, is currently state treasurer. We also have five graduates in the state senate, seven in the Missouri House of Representatives and two graduates serving as United States congressmen from Missouri. In addition, our graduates hold 52 percent (60) of all prosecutor positions in the state.

There are nine UMC graduates among the 29 members of the Missouri Bar Advisory Board. Since 1955, when the Lon O. Hocker award was first given by the Missouri Bar Foundation, 20 UMC graduates have received the presti-

gious award which is given to attorneys under 36 years of age who have demonstrated unusual proficiency in trial advocacy. Also, since 1976, 13 of the 24 Spurgeon Smithson awards given by the Missouri Bar Foundation in recognition of outstanding service in the increase and diffusion of law and justice have gone to UMC graduates.

The School of Law has also contributed much to the University of Missouri. Seven of our living alumni have served as University of Missouri curators and 10 of our

alumni have served as president of the alumni association. Since 1968, eight UMC law faculty members have received University of Missouri distinguished faculty awards and 25 UMC law graduates have received University of Missouri distinguished alumni awards.

This is a record of accomplishment which reflects favorably upon all UMC alumni. We hope that you and our future alumni will continue and improve our level of service to the state and its citizens.

Center for the Study of Dispute Resolution

There is a growing recognition on the part of lawyers and legal scholars that traditional civil litigation is unsatisfactory as a means of resolving some kinds of disputes. The process of pleading, discovery, trial and appeal is often slow, nearly always costly, and frequently causes considerable emotional stress for the participants. Many small disputes go unresolved because the time and expense which must be invested to use the courts cannot be justified. The result is public dissatisfaction with the courts and legal system.

Because of this dissatisfaction there is increasing interest in alternative means of resolving disputes, such as negotiation, mediation, arbitration and specialized courts. Many organizations throughout the nation are attempting to provide dispute resolution services of these types to the public but until now the subject has received little academic attention.

The Center for the Study of Dispute Resolution was conceived as a response to this need. The center will provide members of the UMC faculty with an opportunity for interdisciplinary teaching, research and publication in the field of dispute resolution. The center will increase public understanding of the existing techniques and develop new ones. These ideas and methods can be adopted and incorporated into the legal system, to the advantage of all citizens.

The center's most important objective is to carry out useful research in the dispute resolution field, linking law and non-law faculty. The center will be developing curriculum materials for training law students and sponsoring seminars and continuing education programs for practicing lawyers, judges, arbitrators, mediators and social scientists.

In conjunction with the center, the Missouri Law Review will publish an annual academic journal, The Journal of Dispute Resolution. The publication is designed to focus on issues arising in the various fields of alternative dispute

resolution. The first issue is scheduled for publication in Summer, 1984. (See the Journal announcement and tear out card elsewhere in the Transcript for subscription information.)

The center is under the direct supervision of the law school and its director reports to the dean of the law school. The center will be managed by a director who will divide his time equally between teaching in the law school and administration and research at the center. After a national search for an experienced law professor with an established reputation in the dispute resolution field, Leonard Riskin of the University of Houston Law Center was selected as the Center's director.

Mr. Riskin holds a BS in psychology from the University of Wisconsin, a JD from New York University and an LL.M. from Yale. He participated in the U.S. Attorney General's Honor Recruit Program and has served as general counsel for the National Alliance of Businessmen, Inc. Since 1974, Riskin has taught at the University of Houston where he has taught Torts, Interviewing, Counseling and Mediation.

Riskin has participated in the Academy of Family Mediators Divorce Mediation Training, the Houston Neighborhood Justice Center mediation training and the Project for the Study and Application of Humanistic Education in Law (Columbia University School of Law). He has published widely in the fields of mediation, law and medicine and legal education. Mr. Riskin will begin his duties at UMC this summer.

UMC is very excited to be in the forefront of this developing field. The time is now ripe for serious research, scholarship and teaching in the field of dispute resolution. With the formation of the Center for the Study of Dispute Resolution the Law School should be able to combine the skills of academic lawyers, social scientists and dispute resolution professionals to produce the research and training necessary for public acceptance and full utilization of alternative means of dispute resolution.



Faculty Profile Carl Esbeck

Carl Esbeck grew up on an Iowa farm near the little town of Elk Horn; a town Carl wryly describes as a Danish midwestern Lake Wobegone (after the popular public radio program "Prairie Home Companion"). After attending Iowa State University where he received his BS in mechanical engineering he attended Cornell Law School. While at Cornell, he was selected for the Order of the Coif and served on the Board of Editors of the Cornell Law Review. After law school he clerked for Howard C. Bratten, Chief Judge of the U.S. District Court for the District of New Mexico. While clerking Carl first became interested in teaching. However, without some time in private practice he didn't feel prepared to teach.

His original motive in coming to teach was actually to write and shape the law. Thus, it was a pleasant surprise to discover how much he enjoyed teaching. Esbeck finds UMC students polite and well-meaning with their only fault being an overly practical outlook. He feels that immediate concerns such as passing the bar and beginning practice cause an uphill battle in the classroom. He tries to communicate to his students that it's impossible to sever the law from one's moral, ethical underpinnings; since the law depends on presuppositions, to be a consummate attorney one must know what those are.

Esbeck teaches constitutional law, civil rights and civil procedure. In constitutional law he tries to illuminate what he sees as a battle between the interpretivists who believe the Constitution contains absolutes and the noninterpretivists who believe that the Constitution is an instrument facilitating change to protect minorities from the majority. One difficulty he finds in the area is that there is no strong consensus on the court.

While he enjoys teaching civil procedure to first year students, the course he most enjoys teaching is civil rights; a course he characterizes as a litigation course covering the major federal remedies for civil rights violations. He tries to teach in terms of legal process. That is; given general constitutional principles and vague statutes, the Supreme Court has shaped the law to its view of what the law should be.

Just before he left private practice, Esbeck began the Religious Freedom Reporter in conjunction with the Center for Law and Religious Freedom. He was looking for a library tool which would keep him informed as to recent developments in the legal treatment of religion and church and state relations. Esbeck, who currently serves as editor of the Reporter, feels that the Reporter helps the interested observer detect patterns and directions which would otherwise be missed.

Esbeck, who when pressed, characterizes himself as an evangelical Christian, has written in the area of church and state relations. While he feels that the purpose of publishing is to shape the law, he also recognizes that outside the legal community, few people read law review articles. In order to express his views effectively to a wider audience, he has been writing most recently for several magazines and journals which specialize in church and state relations.

Esbeck characterizes his decision to come to UMC as a mutual choice made very easy for him since he had grown up in the Midwest farm belt. He feels that the faculty at UMC has a strong sense of camraderie, recognizing that there is fun to be had among the work. He and his wife of 10 years, Kathie, feel that Columbia is a pleasant, comfortable location, well suited for rearing their two boys. UMC is very pleased to have Carl Esbeck on the faculty.

He gave an address entitled "Religious Organizations and the First Amendment" at a labor law workshop for religious organizations held in San Bernardino, California in November and presented a paper "The Neutral, Secular State" Imperative or Impossibility?" at a conference on Freedom and Faith '84 in the Chicago area in April. In January he testified before the Missouri House Committee on Children, Youth and Families on the constitutionality of state certification of child care facilities operated by churches and other religious organizations.

David A. Fischer has had an article entitled "The New Settlement Statute: Its History and Effect" accepted for publication by the Journal of the Missouri Bar. In November, Fischer spoke about recent developments in tort law at the Update of the Law Program held in conjunction with the organizational committee meetings of the Missouri Bar and in January, he spoke to the Boone County Bar Association on MAI's for comparative fault cases. Fischer also participated in five CLE programs on comparative fault held in various locations around the state in January and February.

Tim Heinsz has published three arbitration decisions: *The Gas Service Co. and United Steelworkers of America*, 83-2 ARB ¶8429 (1983); *Trans World Airlines, Inc. and Independent Federation of Flight Attendants*, 81 L.A. 524 (1983); *Mead Corp. and United Paperworkers International Union, Local #29*, 83-2- ARB ¶8601 (1983). In November, Heinsz and Jim Westbrook spoke to the Missouri Bar Association in Columbia on "Alternative Dispute Resolution: Why it Might Affect You." Heinsz has also been appointed to the panel of arbitrators for the Iowa Public Relations Board.

Bill Henning is working on an article on the impact of bankruptcy fraudulent conveyance law on Article 9 default foreclosure and is working with George Wallach on a book on Missouri U.C.C. law for West's practice series. In October and December, 1983 he participated in a CLE

program on the law of sales under U.C.C. Article 2, given in Columbia, Kansas City and St. Louis. In January he attended the AALS convention in San Francisco. He is also teaching a three hour contracts class for the Missouri Association of Legal Secretaries as part of an official course accredited by the National Association of Legal Secretaries.

Edward H. Hunvald spoke to the Annual Meeting of Public Defenders, lectured at the Missouri Trial Judges College and participated in the update sessions at the Missouri Bar Meeting and the update session following the Missouri Bar Committee meetings. He is serving on the Missouri Supreme Court Committee on Criminal Instructions and Charges and is chairman of the Criminal Law Drafting Committee of the Multi-State Bar Examination. He also testified before a Missouri House Committee in support of a bill to get rid of the "dead man's statute."

Joan M. Krauskopf has published Cases on Property Division at Marriage Dissolution (West 1984) and "The Elderly Person: When Protection Becomes Abuse," Trial (Dec. 1983) (with co-author Mary Elise Burnett). She has had an article, "Valuing and Dividing Pension Benefits" accepted for publication by the Journal of the Missouri Bar and an article on "Remedies for Parental Kidnapping in Federal Court" accepted by the Ohio State Law Journal. The 3d edition of her book Law for the Elderly is scheduled for publication this spring. In January, Krauskopf was elected secretary of the AALS Family Law Section and in February gave the closing remarks at a Conference on Long Term Care sponsored by the Division of Aging. In January, Krauskopf served as a scholar in residence at the University of Arizona in Tucson.

Grant S. Nelson has co-authored with Dale A. Whitman, "Congressional Preemption of State Restrictions on Mortgage Due-On-Sale Clauses: An analysis of the Garn-St. Germain Act," 35 Hastings Law Journal 201 (1983). He has been appointed by the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws to the Drafting Committee to revise the Uniform Fraudulent Conveyance Act. In November, Nelson gave a CLE program on Recent Developments in Real Estate Finance Law at the National Practice Institute in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Dale Spencer moderated a panel on "Law in the Media" at the Leon Jaworski Symposium on Public Education About the Law in Houston, Texas in November, 1983 and was a panelist on the "First Amendment and Libel" seminar sponsored by Law and Business, Inc. and Legal Times in Washington, D.C. in October.

Tom Sullivan has published a case book entitled *Antitrust Law, Policy and Procedure* (Michie 1984) and is working on two articles: "The AT&T Settlement: Legal Summary, Economic Analysis and Marketing Implications" and "On Non-Price Competition: An Economic and Marketing Analysis." In September, he spoke on current developments in civil procedure to the annual meeting of the Missouri Bar. In October, he moderated a UMC CLE in St.

Louis on Fundamentals of Antitrust Practice and Current Developments during which he lectured on the law of monopolization under the Sherman Act. During the 1984-85 term Sullivan will be a Visiting Professor of Law at Washington University School of Law.

Richard B. Tyler is conducting an empirical study of Missouri's Blue Sky Law, comparing performance of stocks registered in Missouri with stocks denied registration. He is currently serving as a member of the subcommittee to study the revised Uniform Limited Partnership Act, of the Missouri Bar Committee on Corporation Banking and Business Law. In October he attended a Conference on Corporate Governance in Columbus, Ohio.

James E. Westbrook has published three arbitration decisions: H.E. Miller Oldsmobile and International Association of Machinists, Lodge 778, 83-2 ARB ¶8604 (1983); Stupp Brothers Bridge and Iron Co. and Steelworkers, Local 15409, 83-1 ARB ¶8099 and 80 L.A. 499 (1903); Missouri Power and Light Co. and International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, Local 2, 83-1 ARB ¶8075 (1983). He spoke on the impact of alternative dispute resolution on the legal profession at the November meeting of the Missouri Bar in Columbia. Westbrook is also chairman of a committee organizing an association to promote the interests of higher education in Missouri.

Dale A. Whitman has co-authored with Grant S. Nelson, "Congressional Preemption of State Restrictions on Mortgage Due-on-Sale Clauses: An Analysis of the Garn-St. Germain Act" 35 Hastings Law Journal 201 (1983). Dean Whitman has also completed, with Roger Cunningham of the University of Michigan and William Stoebuck of the University of Washington, a new treatise entitled Real Property Law (West, 1984). It will be available in both student and lawyer editions. The lawyer's edition will contain materials on drafting commercial leases and real estate contracts.

Merrell Favors Funding New Law School

On October 20, 1983 Democratic gubernatorial candidate Norman Merrell spoke to the UMC School of Law. Merrell noted the responsibility that the law school bears in its service to the people of Missouri. The young men and women emerging from the school play vital parts in the political, social and economic leadership of the state. Because of the large part that law plays in our society today, he stated that it is necessary that adequate money be appropriated to build a new law school at UMC.

Merrell characterized the new building as a number one priority for the next two legislative sessions. If these efforts are unsuccessful, if elected governor he will make a new law school a high priority in his first budget message. Merrell encouraged students to let the legislature know of their needs and encouraged the law school community to get its people out to raise matching funds. Merrell noted that facilities which generate private donor support are more likely to be funded making it harder for the legislature to say no.

Alumni Receptions in California

Two alumni receptions were held recently for UMC graduates in California. One group met in San Diego just prior to the Holiday Bowl football game on December 23, 1983. The host was Ed Chapin ('72) of the San Diego firm of Wingert, Grebing, Anello & Chapin. Present from the University were President Olson, Chancellor Uehling, Dean Whitman and his wife, Marge, and Professor Henry Lowe and his wife, Nancy. Although Mizzou did not win the game, a good time was had by all attending.

A reception for alumni in the San Francisco Bay area was held on January 6, 1984 at the St. Francis Yacht Club in San Francisco. Hosts for this event were Bruce Denebeim ('51), general counsel of Union Bank of California, and Gary Hultquist ('67) of the San Francisco firm of Bronson, Bronson & McKinnan. The reception was held during the annual meeting of the Association of American Law Schools in San Francisco, so many of the present and past faculty members from the law school attended.

THE NEW MISSOURI LAW REVIEW


This new publication was launched last year and is proving to be an invaluable asset to the School. It supplants the old Law Series, which had appeared quite irregularly for several years. The Law Faculty voted unanimously to begin the publication of a review that would conform both as to content and format to the periodicals published by the other larger law schools of the country. The plan was approved by the Board of Curators of the University. Volume I was published last year, and number 1 of Volume II appeared in January of this year. It is a quarterly appearing in January, April, June, and November. A small annual subscription of \$2.50 is charged. (1937)

- A Letter to the Alumni of the Law School -

With the Selective Service age lowered to eighteen, it is now impossible for students to complete their prelegal studies to enter law school before their period of service begins. Of the total number of law students in the country a good part is concentrated in the evening divisions of a relatively small number of schools located in large cities. The Section on Legal Education and Admission to the Bar of the American Bar Association made a study of the condition of law schools as of March 1, 1943. The report shows our enrollment at that time consisted of 40 students. (1943)

The stack space for books has been completely filled. A library of over 50,000 volumes develops a momentum from continuations and necessary acquisitions that cannot be stopped or even slowed down. The temporary shelves constructed in the corridor of the basement are not only filled but they have proved to be inaccessible. Books on inaccessible shelves are of little value in the study of law. 
New Professor

Work on the New Wing

Work is progressing in a satisfactory manner at present on the new wing to Tate Hall, but it appears that construction will not be complete by August as originally planned. The brick and stone exterior is completed on the first two floors and there are two floors to go. Some of the interior work is being done on the court-room located on the first floor of the wing. A necessary inconvenience will be that the summer session must be held in another University building, since the stairway in the present building will be removed to make way for a new stairway which will serve both the present building and the new wing.

The wing is being constructed with a \$500,000 appropriation by the Missouri General Assembly. Since construction costs have increased so much since the original estimates were presented to the legislature and approved, it was not possible to include in the contract all the needs for the building furnishings. The Law School Alumni Association is currently soliciting for funds with which to provide some of the things which were not included. (1960)




RECORD LAW ENROLLMENT
