NOVAE NARRATIONES. Edited by Elsie Shanks, Ph.D., Radcliffe College, and S.F.C. Milsom, Fellow of New College, Oxford, Selden Society Publications, Volume 80. London: Bernard Quaritch, 1963. Pp. cciii, 384. £ 4. 4 s. Od.*

Novae Narrationes is a legal formulary in Anglo-Norman compiled about 1300, a collection of model forms of the important opening address (*narratio*, count) made in court by the demandant's or plaintiff's counsel, who lays before the Justices in exactly prescribed phrases the whole nature of his client's suit. Quite frequently the defence, or reply of the defendant's counsel, is also given. The counts, some of them taken from actual cases, illustrate the various types of action such as right, dower, wardship, replevin, and many more, and include many alternative phrasings to fit a variety of situations.
